Sunday 17th October 2021 – 29th Sunday Ordinary Time Year B

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Our fourth and final cardinal virtue is temperance, from the Latin verb *temperare* meaning to control or regulate. If fortitude controls our reaction to fear, temperance controls our attraction to pleasure, making sure it remains under the control of reason. When I was in France, I often heard people say, "*C'est plus fort que moi*" (It's stronger than me) to describe their failure to resist temptations. It denoted resignation to being weak-willed, but the virtuous person is not dragged around by passions run amok.

The discussion of temperance has traditionally been concerned especially with food, drink, and sexuality. Activities essential for survival have strong pleasures attached to them in order to ensure their accomplishment. This holds true for eating and drinking. The desire for food and drink can, however, tend toward excess, causing us to actually damage our health rather than sustain it. Because sexual union is the means by which human life is perpetuated in the world, the pleasure associated with it and the corresponding desire for it are especially intense. This desire can also get out of control and even become destructive to body and soul. A major issue which adds to the sexual distortion in the minds of many today is the effect of using the internet for immoral purposes. The spread of indecent imagery has left many poor souls enslaved to lust. Once the imagination has been poisoned at length in this manner, it is a hard battle to return to self-control because we are creatures of habit. Thankfully, by God's grace it is possible to recover inner freedom. The website covenanteyes.com is there to help.

The Christian teaching has always been that sexual activity outside the holy covenant of marriage is sinful because it is the "body language" designed by God to express total self-giving to one other person. This gift of self through the union of love is meant to be irrevocable, mirrored by the fact that the two become one flesh only after vowing to be joined forever. A stable lifelong marriage is also the optimal situation for welcoming new life and so it is the proper place for sexual intimacy. Although people have always struggled to live this teaching, the rationality of it was at least understood in days gone by. However, since the spread of the contraceptive pill in the 1960's the connection between marriage, sexuality, and procreation, began to grow weaker in many people's minds. By means of artificial birth control (and with legalised abortion as a back-up measure) humanity had found a way of ignoring the constraints inherent in the natural laws of sexuality. The change in mentality led to a revolution in morality whose effects will be felt for generations to come. Before long, even some baptised souls would come to accept meaningless promiscuity as something normal. This was hailed as a great triumph by radical atheists like Christopher Hitchens who were shrewd enough to foresee that wherever Christian morality dies, faith will soon disappear too. However, the believer still seeks to discern the original meaning and purpose written into the beautiful gift of sexuality by the Creator (a study known as teleology). Reason enlightened by faith can interpret the divine secrets inscribed into our very biology as embodied spirits. We often call this the Theology of the Body. Chastity means simply to live our sexuality in harmony with the plan of God. It is one of the essential elements of the overall self-mastery that is temperance.
